I am writing on behalf of Decatur Cooperative Ministry (DCM) to formally request the transfer of the grant # GA0289L4B082208 - GA-508 – Family Success Project, Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) program, currently held by our organization to Nicholas House. Nicholas House, an esteemed nonprofit organization in our community, is dedicated to helping families experiencing homelessness become self-sufficient by providing them with stable housing while addressing the root causes of their homelessness so that they never become homeless again.

The mission of Decatur Cooperative Ministry is to help families facing homelessness settle into safe, stable homes and build healthy lives filled with peace, hope, and opportunity. 


